01 / EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Electricity at the heart of industrial growth

The 23 July 2026 roundtable connected project needs, technical capabilities and investment support across both shores.



The morning working session brought institutional and business perspectives to the same table.

Building on AMEISS 2025 in Nouakchott, the Las Palmas meeting focused on the energy infrastructure needed to support sustainable industrial growth. Public institutions, financial organisations and private-sector leaders examined opportunities for cooperation between Mauritania and the Canary Islands.

The discussion linked generation and grids with logistics, industrial supply, research and financing. The contributions point towards a common task: translating bilateral relationships into well-defined projects, supported by the technical expertise and institutional networks of both territories.

The 2026 electricity initiative continued the dialogue opened at AMEISS 2025, with a stronger focus on project development and operational cooperation.

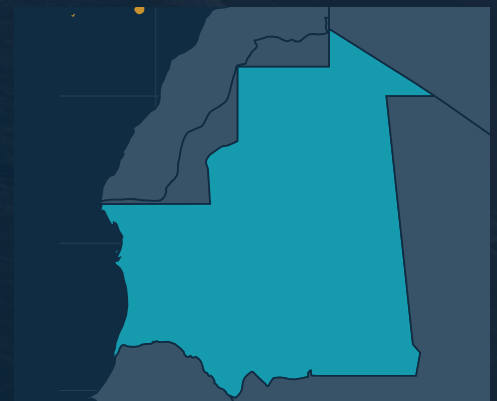

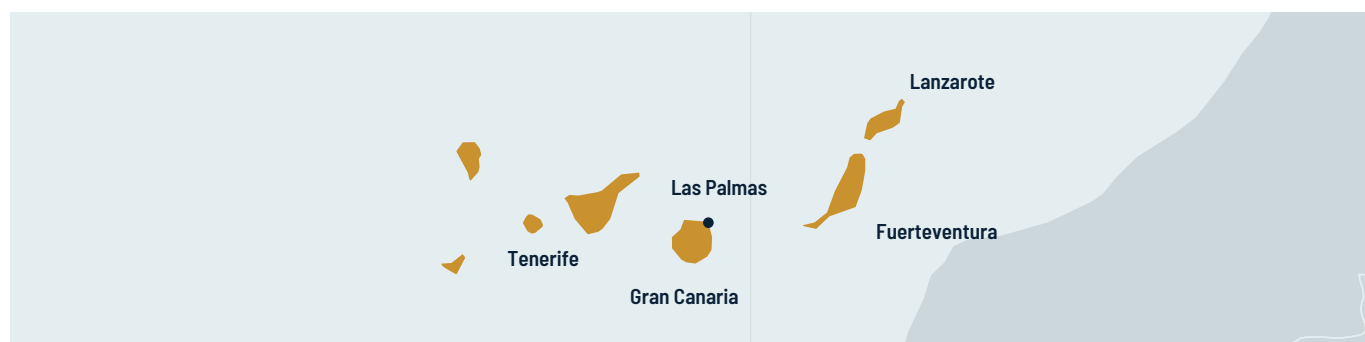

The roundtable highlighted how these capabilities can complement Mauritanian projects. Reliable supply chains, specialised training and shared technical work are central to that relationship.

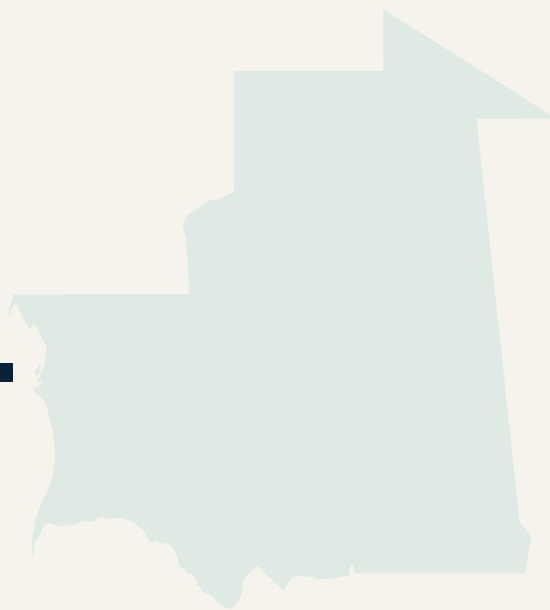


Canary Islands, Spain. Locator map made with Natural Earth.

SOMELEC outlined electricity infrastructure priorities spanning power plants, high-voltage transmission and battery energy storage systems. These needs were complemented by electrical engineering capabilities presented by Grupo Iprocel and turnkey energy solutions from Clarke Energy.

Gas and renewable energy

The Banda gas-to-power development, presented through TotalEnergies / GoGas, and GreenGo Energy's Megaton Moon initiative brought gas, renewable generation and green hydrogen into the discussion. CEM / CDS added the perspective of industrial solar development and vocational training.

OnePort Canarias, Zamakona Yards, Scomat, Suisca Group, Maurilog and Servilog brought complementary perspectives on maritime services and integrated land and sea logistics. Scomat presented cooperation with Zamakona Yards around ship repair and technical training in Nouakchott.

Anidia, Valsons Soluciones and Techno Systems contributed industrial supply, procurement and distribution expertise. Their contributions addressed the practical challenge of connecting project requirements with dependable materials, spare parts and technical support between Europe and West Africa.
